



Attendance Policy and Procedures

Fairview Community Primary School

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Part 1 - Policy

1. Introduction

At Fairview Community Primary School, our ambition is for all pupils to strive for 100% attendance. We set clear expectations for excellent attendance and expect pupils to be present for every session, every day that school is open. We believe this is fundamental to pupils achieving their full potential and securing positive lifelong outcomes.

Our Attendance Policy reflects this commitment and acknowledges that regular attendance positively influences pupil motivation, attainment, and wellbeing. It is a core component of our school ethos.

We recognise that some pupils may face greater challenges in attending school regularly. Therefore, at every stage of improving attendance, we will work collaboratively with parents/carers, pupils, and relevant partner agencies to identify and remove barriers. We are committed to building strong, trusting relationships that support sustained attendance. Promoting and securing excellent attendance is a shared responsibility across our school and wider community.

Fairview Community Primary School expects all pupils to maintain attendance of at least 96%, in line with expectations set by Medway Local Authority and National standards. We also acknowledge that some pupils joining our provision may have experienced extended periods of absence. This will be considered when addressing and supporting their attendance.

This policy will be reviewed and updated annually to reflect current legislation and guidance. The [Department for Education's guidance, Working Together to Improve School Attendance \(2026\)](#), states that school attendance is “essential for pupils to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing, and wider life chances.”

Aims and ethos

Our school aims to meet its obligations regarding school attendance by ensuring every pupil has access to a full-time and efficient education to which they are entitled. Fairview Community Primary School acts early to address any patterns of irregular attendance aiming to create a culture in which the importance of good school attendance is understood, valued, and supported by all.

By providing a calm, orderly, safe, and supportive environment where all pupils want to be and are keen and ready to learn is the foundation of securing good attendance. Working together to put the right support in place at the right time, all school staff, parents/carers, pupils, and partners can work together to remove any barriers affecting attendance.

This policy sets out our school's position on attendance and details the procedures that all parents¹ must follow to report their child's absence from school and to remind them of their legal duty, to ensure their child attends school regularly.

This policy will be applied fairly and consistently, considering the individual needs of our pupils and their families who may have specific barriers to attendance. We have considered our obligations under the [Equality Act 2010](#) and the [UN Convention on the Rights of the Child](#).

At Fairview Community Primary School we follow the [DfE Working together to Improve School Attendance](#) Approach:

Expect

Aspire to high standards of attendance from all pupils and parents and build a culture where all can, and want to, be in school and ready to learn by prioritising attendance improvement across the school.

Monitor

Rigorously use attendance data to identify patterns of poor attendance (at individual and cohort level) as soon as possible so all parties can work together to resolve them before they become entrenched.

Listen and understand

¹ Education law defines parents as: all natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person who has parental responsibility for a child or young person; and any person who has day to day care of a child or young person i.e., lives with and looks after the child. In this policy the term 'parent' includes parents and carers.

When a pattern is spotted, discuss with pupils and parents to listen to and understand barriers to attendance and agree how all partners can work together to resolve them.

Facilitate support

Remove barriers in school and help pupils and parents to access the support they need to overcome the barriers outside of school. This might include an early help or whole family plan where absence is a symptom of wider issues.

Formalise support

Where absence persists and voluntary support is not working or not being engaged with, partners should work together to explain the consequences clearly and ensure support is also in place to enable families to respond. Depending on the circumstances this may include formalising support through an attendance contract or education supervision order.

Enforce

Where all other avenues have been exhausted and support is not working or not being engaged with, enforce attendance through statutory intervention: a penalty notice in line with the National Framework or prosecution to protect the pupil's right to an education.

Where attendance concerns arise, our first priority will always be to understand the reasons and work with families to provide support.

It is vital that children develop regular attendance habits at an early age. Therefore, the school encourages parents of nursery and reception children who are not yet of compulsory school age to send their children to every session that is available to them. Every child enrolled at our school is expected to attend every day they are required to, on time, so that they can achieve their full potential. We monitor and manage attendance and punctuality across all year groups and expect parents to notify the school of any absence.

At Fairview Community Primary School we will support parents to perform their legal duty to ensure their children of compulsory² school age attend regularly and will promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

We want our pupils to attend school every day unless they are not well enough to do so. We believe that children who attend school regularly are more likely to feel settled in school, maintain friendships, keep up with their learning and gain the greatest benefit from their education. We want all our pupils to enjoy school and grow up to become emotionally resilient, confident and competent adults who are able to realise their full potential. Regular attendance and punctuality are essential requirements in the workplace and children who are used to attending school on time, and on every occasion unless they are too unwell to attend, will be better prepared for the world.

² A child becomes of 'compulsory school age' on the 1 January, 1 April or 1 September following their 5th birthday and ceases to be of compulsory school age on the last Friday in June of Year 11.

In April 2017 the Supreme Court clarified the definition of regular attendance to be attendance “in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school”, therefore if an absence is **not** authorised by the school, the pupil’s attendance is deemed to be irregular.

We will do all we can to encourage our pupils to attend. We will also make available the best provision we can, for any pupil who may experience any barriers preventing regular attendance.

One of the most important factors in promoting good attendance is the development of positive attitudes towards school and a sense of belonging. To this end, we strive to make our school a happy and rewarding experience for all children, and to foster positive and mutually respectful relationships with parents.

By promoting good attendance and punctuality we aim to:

- Make good attendance and punctuality a priority for all those involved and as part of the wider school community.
- Raise pupils’ awareness of the importance of good attendance and punctuality.
- Provide support, advice and guidance to parents, pupils and staff.
- Work in partnership with parents and carers, including regularly informing them about their child’s absence and attendance levels.
- Work with external agencies where required, such as health, the LA and local organisations to support our pupils, parents and school.
- Support pupils back into school following a lengthy or unavoidable period of absence and provide support to build confidence and bridge learning gaps.
- Celebrate good and improved attendance and punctuality.

2. Why is Attending School Regularly So Important?

Evidence shows pupils with excellent school attendance are more likely to reach higher standards of achievement and be at less risk of exposure to crime and other safeguarding risks.

Pupils who attend regularly are more likely to achieve better results than their peers that do not, both at Key Stage 2 tests in the Primary phase, and in GCSEs at Secondary.

Excellent attendance enables pupils to be part of the school community and develop a sense of belonging. This further supports each pupil’s development socially, morally, and ethically, enhancing personal well-being.

3. Safeguarding and Attendance

At Fairview Community Primary School, we routinely monitor attendance data to identify trends and patterns of absence across all pupils as part of our standard procedures. We recognise that both sudden and gradual changes in a pupil's attendance may be indicative of underlying safeguarding concerns.

In line with the Department for Education's statutory guidance [Keeping Children Safe in Education](#), the school will investigate and report any suspected safeguarding issues to the appropriate authorities. As part of our safeguarding responsibilities, and in accordance with our procedures, we will notify the Local Authority and/or the Police of any pupil who is absent from school and whose whereabouts cannot be established, despite reasonable enquiries such as, contacting all emergency contact and home visits. This action will be taken where there are concerns for the pupil's welfare or safety.

Regular attendance is an important part of safeguarding children and promoting their welfare and wellbeing. The school recognises that unexplained, persistent, or sudden changes in attendance may indicate that a pupil is experiencing difficulties, barriers to learning, or may require additional support. For this reason, attendance is monitored as part of the school's wider safeguarding responsibilities and concerns will be responded to promptly and proportionately.

5. Using data to support improvements in attendance

Any absence affects the pattern of a child's schooling and regular absence may seriously affect their learning. The Department for Education (DfE) defines a pupil as a 'persistent absentee' (PA) when they miss 10% or more schooling across the school year, for

whatever reason. For pupils who miss more than 50% of possible sessions they are defined as 'severely absent' (SA).

The school will routinely monitor attendance data to identify emerging attendance concerns and take proactive action to prevent pupils from becoming persistently or severely absent. This will include monitoring the attendance of pupils who have a social worker, those subject to Child Protection plans or Child in Need, and those working with Youth Justice Services, ensuring that early help, targeted support and multi-agency collaboration are provided where appropriate.

This will include identifying the individual needs of pupils, working closely with families and relevant services to remove barriers to attendance, and, where a more formalised approach is required, working in partnership with the local authority in line with the statutory DfE guidance [Working Together to Improve School Attendance](#).

The school will routinely analyse attendance data by vulnerable group, including Children in Care, previously looked after children, pupils with SEND, EHCPs, pupils eligible for FSM/Pupil Premium, Young Carers, EAL pupils, children known to Social Care, Gypsy Roma Traveller pupils and pupils with medical needs. Attendance concerns will trigger early intervention and targeted support.

6. Understanding Barriers to Attendance

In relation to understanding barriers to attendance, we will ensure all pupils and parents are treated with dignity and staff will model respectful relationships to build a positive understanding between home and school that can be the foundation of good attendance. In communicating with parents, we will highlight the link between attendance and attainment and wider wellbeing to enhance understanding of what good attendance looks like. Where a pupil or family needs support with attendance we will identify who is best placed to work with them to address issues.

We will support pupils and parents by working together to address any in-school barriers to attendance. Where barriers are outside of the school's control, all partners should work together to support pupils and parents to access any support they may need voluntarily.

Support strategies will be reviewed regularly to assess impact and adapted where necessary to ensure they remain appropriate to the needs of the pupil and family.

Some pupils face greater barriers to attendance than their peers. These can include pupils who suffer from long term medical conditions or who have special educational needs and disabilities. In working with parents to improve attendance, we are mindful of the barriers such pupils may face and will put additional support in place where necessary to help them access their full-time education.

In line with DfE expectations reduced timetables will only be used in exceptional circumstances, for a limited period, to support pupils to reintegrate back into education and access full time provision.

The school is committed to sharing information and work collaboratively with other schools in the area, local authorities and external partners when absence is at risk of becoming persistent or severe.

In accordance with statutory guidance, school must report to Medway Local Authority when a pupil has been absent for 10 consecutive school days without explanation, and

also when a pupil has accrued 15 days of absence due to medical reasons. These reports should be made promptly to ensure appropriate safeguarding and support measures can be considered.

7. Staff Training on Attendance

Improving attendance requires knowledge of guidance and regulations but also expertise in working with families to remove barriers to attendance and safeguard pupils. Just as those barriers are regularly evolving, so too is the training that school staff require to address them. The school therefore will facilitate training for all staff to understand:

- the importance of good attendance and that absence is almost always a symptom of wider circumstances,
- the law and requirements of schools including on the keeping of pupil registers
- the school/trusts' strategies and procedures for tracking, following up and improving attendance,
- processes for working with other partners to provide more intensive support for pupils who need it.

For staff with specialist attendance responsibilities, they will receive training to include the necessary skills to interpret and analyse attendance data and any additional training that would be beneficial to support pupils experiencing attendance challenges.

Part 2 - What the Law Says and Our School Procedures

1. Contents of the Admissions Register

At Fairview Community Primary School, we maintain our admissions register (also referred to as the school roll) in accordance with the requirements set out in [Regulation 8 of the School Attendance \(Pupil Registration\) \(England\) Regulations 2024](#). The register must include specific personal details for every pupil, including:

- Full name and name used at school
- Sex
- Date of birth
- Unique Pupil Number (UPN)
- Home address
- Full names and addresses of each parent/carer
- Emergency contact details (at least two telephone number per parent/carer the pupil normally lives with)
- Date of admission or re-admission
- Name and address of the last school attended (where applicable)
- Boarding status (where relevant)
- Any additional addresses where the pupil will normally reside and the date from which they will reside there
- Details of any other school the pupil is attending concurrently

Pupils are entered on the admission register on their starting day, before or at the beginning of the first school session on that day. This is normally the first day agreed between the school and the parent/carer for the pupil to attend, or, where no day has been agreed, the first day the pupil attends the school.

A pupil's name may only be lawfully removed from the admissions register if one of the specific conditions outlined in [Regulation 9 of the 2024 Regulations applies](#). Any removal outside of these conditions constitutes unlawful off-rolling.

It is essential that the admissions register is kept accurate and up to date. Therefore, Fairview Community Primary School regularly requests updates from parents/carers regarding changes to:

- Home address
- Emergency contact telephone numbers
- Email addresses

The school will formally issue a data collection request during academic year. Where parents/carers do not respond to these requests, the school will take further steps to obtain accurate information. This may include direct contact, home visits, or referral to relevant agencies if safeguarding concerns arise.

Contents of Attendance Register

In addition to the admissions register the law makes it clear that schools must take an attendance register at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second (afternoon) session.

Registers will be taken at the published registration times and applied consistently for all registered pupils.

On each occasion the school must record whether each pupil is:

- Present;
- Absent;
- Attending an approved educational activity; or,
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances.

Effective and timely use and sharing of register data is critical to improve attendance and is supported by the use of our Management Information System (MIS) to record attendance information.

2. Present at School (and Lateness)

Pupils are marked present if they are in school when the register is taken. If a pupil leaves the school premises after registration, they are still counted as present for statistical purposes.

It is the duty of parents to ensure that children attend school on time. This encourages habits of good timekeeping and lessens any possible classroom disruption.

The Attendance Lead will meet with parents of those children who are frequently late arriving at school to investigate reasons and suggest solutions to enable more punctual attendance.

Please refer to Appendix 1 for the timings of our school day.

If a pupil arrives after the register has closed (9:00am or 1:30pm) they will be marked with the unauthorised absence code “Late after registers close” (**U**) which is an unauthorised absence mark. However, if the pupil is late arriving due to a valid reason such as an unavoidable medical appointment, the absence will be authorised and coded accordingly.

2.1 Effects of Late Arrival at School

When a pupil arrives late to school, they miss notable events such as assembly, tutor period, teacher instructions and introductions. Children can often feel embarrassed having to enter a classroom late.

The table below indicates how frequent lateness can add up to a considerable amount of learning being lost. This can seriously disadvantage children and disrupt the learning of others:

Minutes late per day...	Equates to days of teaching lost in one year...	Which means this number of lessons have been missed...
5 mins	3 Days	15 Lessons
10 mins	6 Days	30 Lessons
15 mins	9 Days	45 Lessons
20 mins	12 days	60 Lessons
30 mins	18 days	90 Lessons

3. Authorised Absence

‘Authorised absence’ means that the school has either given approval in advance for a pupil of compulsory school age to be away from the school or has accepted an explanation offered afterwards as justification for absence.

Parents/carers cannot authorise any absence, only the Headteacher can do this. However, parents/carers can provide reasons for absence for the school to consider.

The following information outlines the main circumstances where absence may be authorised by the school:

3.1 Illness

The NHS has produced a helpful guide for parents regarding childhood illness and school: [Is my child too ill for school?](#)

In most cases, absences for illness which are reported by parents/carers following the school’s absence reporting procedures will be authorised. That is unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

The school follows the statutory DfE guidance [‘Working Together to Improve School Attendance’](#) which states that if the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask the parent to provide medical evidence, such as a prescription, appointment card, or other appropriate form of evidence.

We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily. In some exceptional circumstances, the school may ask the parent for further clarification, or the school may seek parental permission to contact the pupil’s GP/Paediatrician directly to help support the needs of the individual pupil.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

Where a pupil has a high level and/or frequency of absence, the school may require medical evidence of some description in order to best support the child or young person and to be able to authorise any future absences. If this is the case, the school will make the parent/s aware of this expectation in advance.

The reporting of absence due to illness remains the responsibility of the parent/carer. Absences due to illness which have **not** been reported to the school by the parent/carer on the first day, or subsequent days of absence may not be authorised.

Parents should inform the school of illness on Parentmail or by telephone (01634 338710).

If a child is absent for more than one day, the parent should contact the school on each day to provide an update on the child’s condition, unless otherwise agreed by the school.

Where a pupil’s attendance is affected by a physical or mental health condition, SEND, or other identified need, the school will work in partnership with parents/carers and relevant professionals to understand and remove barriers to attendance. Support may include reasonable adjustments, pastoral or SEND support, and phased reintegration where appropriate.

Where illness-related absence becomes frequent, prolonged or recurring, the school will work with families and relevant agencies to identify underlying barriers and agree appropriate support to improve attendance and access to education.

In accordance with statutory guidance, schools must report to Medway Local Authority when a pupil has accrued 15 days of absence due to medical reasons. These reports should be made promptly to ensure appropriate safeguarding and support measures can be considered.

We recognise that some pupils may experience physical health difficulties, mental health challenges, special educational needs or other circumstances that can affect attendance. Where this happens, we will work with families and relevant professionals to provide appropriate support.

Pupils taken ill during the school day

If a pupil needs to be sent home due to illness, this should be by agreement with an appropriately authorised member of school staff. In such circumstances, the pupil must be collected from the school office by a parent or another authorised adult and signed out. No pupil will be allowed to leave the school site without parental confirmation

3.2 Medical/Dental Appointments

Parents should always try to make appointments outside of school hours wherever possible. Where appointments during school time are urgent or unavoidable, the pupil should only be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary for the appointment. It is not acceptable for a child to miss a whole day of schooling for an appointment, unless absolutely necessary, in which case the school will need an explanation as to why this is.

If a pupil must attend a medical appointment during the school day, they must be collected from the school office by the parent or another authorised adult and signed out in the 'signing out' book. No pupil will be allowed to leave the school site without parental confirmation.

Advance notice is required for medical or dental appointments and must be supported by providing the school with sight of, or a copy of, the appointment card or letter – only then will the absence be authorised.

3.3 Religious Observance

Our school acknowledges the multi-faith nature of the school community and recognises that on some occasions, religious festivals may fall outside of school holidays or weekends. In accordance with the law, the school will authorise one day's absence for a day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the parent belongs. Should any additional days be taken, these will be recorded in the register as unauthorised absence. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents' religious body, to confirm whether the day is set apart.

3.4 Traveller Absence

The school will authorise the absence of a Traveller pupil (mobile child)³ of no fixed abode who is unable to attend school because they are travelling with their parent who is engaged in a trade or business of such a nature as to require them to travel from place to place. This is subject to certain limits, depending on the child's age and number of sessions absent. The school will discuss cases individually with Traveller parents as necessary. Parents should let the school know of their plans as far in advance as possible. Authorised Traveller absence will be recorded appropriately in the register.

To help ensure continuity of education for Traveller children, wherever possible, the child should attend school elsewhere when their family is travelling for occupational purposes.

In such situations the child will be dual registered at that school and this school will remain their 'main' school.

Children from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities whose families do not travel for occupational purposes are expected to register at school and attend as all other peers. They are subject to the same rules as other children in terms of the requirement to attend school regularly.

The School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024 (3) "mobile child" means a child of compulsory school age who has no fixed abode and whose parent is engaged in a trade or business of such a nature as to require them to travel from place to place.

3.5 Suspensions

If the school decides to send a pupil home due to their behaviour, this will be recorded as an E code, for a suspension or Permanent Exclusion (PEX). The school will follow the statutory [DfE Suspension and Permanent Exclusion guidance](#).

Any suspension/permanent exclusion **must** be agreed by the headteacher.

The school will notify the parent of the exclusion in writing. If the pupil is a Child in Care, the school will notify the pupil's carer, social worker and the Virtual School. In other instances, where a pupil is open to Children's Social Care for any reason, the school will also inform their allocated social worker.

The pupil must be collected from the school office by the parent or another authorised adult and signed out in the 'signing out' book. No pupil will be allowed to leave the school site without parental confirmation.

3.5 Sporting Activities

Requests for attendance at sporting events will only be authorised if the request is supported by a letter from the relevant club/academy/organised event.

4. First Day of Absence Response

At our school, we have robust procedures in place to respond promptly to pupil absence on the first day it occurs (please refer to Appendix 2)

Parents/carers have a **legal responsibility** to ensure that their child attends school regularly and to notify the school as soon as possible on the first day of absence, providing a clear reason for the absence. Parents/carers are expected to maintain regular contact with the school throughout any period of absence.

Where a pupil is absent and no reason has been provided by the parent/carer, we will make same-day contact with the parent/carer to establish the reason for the absence and to ensure the pupil's safety. This will normally include telephone contact and may also involve text message, email, or other agreed methods of communication.

Parents/carers are required to provide the school with up-to-date contact details. Parents will be asked to supply details of **at least two people** (other than parent/carers) who can

be contacted in an emergency. These details will be reviewed regularly (e.g. termly) through data collection exercises, parents' evenings, and school communications.

If we are unable to make contact with a parent/carers, we will make all reasonable efforts to do so using all available contact details, including emergency contacts.

In line with our safeguarding responsibilities and *Keeping Children Safe in Education*, where we are unable to establish contact and a pupil's whereabouts cannot be confirmed, we will take further action without delay. Regular attendance is an important part of safeguarding children and promoting their wellbeing.

This will include making reasonable enquiries to establish the pupil's whereabouts and welfare. These enquiries will include:

- contacting all known emergency contacts
- checking with siblings' schools or settings, where appropriate
- liaising with other professionals or agencies involved with the family, including Medway Local Authority, where appropriate

Where contact cannot be established and concerns remain, we will undertake a home visit where it is safe and appropriate to do so.

If no contact is made following a home visit, a calling card or letter will be left at the property requesting urgent contact with the school. If there is no response and concerns remain regarding the pupil's safety or welfare, we will take appropriate safeguarding action in line with local procedures. This may include referral to Children's Social Care, initiating Children Missing Education (CME) procedures, and/or contacting the Police to request a welfare check.

We prioritise follow-up for vulnerable pupils, including:

- Children in Care (Looked After Children)
- pupils subject to Child Protection Plans
- pupils open to Children's Social Care as a Child in Need
- pupils previously reported missing or at risk of going missing
- younger pupils where absence is unexpected

We will ensure that all actions taken in response to first day absence and subsequent absences are clearly recorded, including attempts to contact parents/carers, outcomes of enquiries, and any safeguarding decisions made.

The school will liaise with Medway Local Authority Attendance Officer where absence is of concern and will notify Medway Local Authority of any pupil who is absent for 10 consecutive school days, in line with statutory requirements.

Home visits form part of the school's attendance and safeguarding procedures and may be undertaken where contact cannot be established, attendance concerns escalate or the school needs to verify a pupil's welfare.

These procedures are in place to safeguard pupils and promote their wellbeing, ensuring that no child is missing education without timely and appropriate action being taken.

5. Rewarding Good and Improved Attendance

Attendance is celebrated in our newsletters to inform parents of our percentage against the national benchmark of 96%

- Termly attendance certificates are awarded to children whose attendance is above 96%
- Annual 100% attendance is awarded with a badge and certificate
- Weekly attendance trophies are awarded in our Celebration Assembly for the class in each phase (FS/KS1/LKS2/UKS2) with the highest weekly attendance
- Parents/carers receive a letter about the importance of school attendance at the beginning of each academic year
- Visual reminders of the impact of missing education communicated to parents throughout the year
- Pupil's attendance is shared with parents at parent evenings (Term 2/4).

6. Leave of Absence Requests – ‘Exceptional Circumstances’

The law does not grant parents the automatic right to take their child out of school during term time.

In line with statutory DfE expectations only very exceptional circumstances will warrant an authorised leave of absence. The school will review each application individually, considering the specific facts and circumstances and relevant background context behind the request. The request must be made by the parent with whom the child normally lives, and permission must be sought in advance. The school will not grant leave of absence unless there are exceptional circumstances. The school must be satisfied that there are exceptional circumstances, based on the individual facts and circumstances of the case; following consultation with other staff as required, including the Attendance Lead/Designated Safeguarding Lead/Family Support Manager. If any leave of absence is granted, the school will determine the number of days the pupil can be away from school. A leave of absence is granted entirely at the school's discretion.

Circumstances which could be authorised include significant family emergencies or funerals. However, parents will also be aware that, wherever possible, it can be better for children to continue to attend school normally during difficult family times.

Parents should complete a Leave of Absence Request form which is available from the school. The request should be submitted as soon as it is anticipated; and wherever possible, at least four weeks before the absence. **Although such absence may be unauthorised, it is better that we know your child is safe, rather than missing.** Please be aware that you may be required to provide us with additional evidence in order to support your request. If we have any concerns about possible safeguarding risks (such as risk of female genital mutilation (FGM) or Forced Marriage, we will follow the necessary protocols. (Please see our school's Safeguarding Policy for more information)

Leave of absence requests for pupils to participate in protest activity, demonstrations, campaigns, marches or similar events during school hours will not normally be authorised. Such requests would not generally be considered exceptional circumstances under the DfE's Working Together to Improve School Attendance 2026 guidance and will ordinarily be recorded as unauthorised absence. The Headteacher retains discretion to consider the individual circumstances of each request.

All term time absence for children in care should be discussed at the child's Personal Education Planning (PEP) meeting, in advance where possible, to be considered alongside social care staff and the Virtual School. This permission should be gained before school is approached for approval. The school will contact social care/ the Virtual School in relation to any requests made for term time absence for a child in care.

Any holiday-related absence taken that includes 10 sessions in 10 weeks, may result in an Education Penalty Notice. In this instance, a 'Notice to Improve' notification will not be issued beforehand.

7. Unauthorised Absence

Unauthorised absence is where a school has not been given a reason or is not satisfied with the reasons given for the absence.

Absence will be unauthorised if a pupil is absent from school without the permission of the school. Whilst parents can provide explanations for absences, it remains the school's decision whether to authorise an absence or not.

Unauthorised absences may include:

- Absences which have never been properly explained
- Pupils who arrive at school too late to get a mark
- Absences for shopping, birthdays, day trips
- Absences whereby parents are stating they are waiting at home for a washing machine to be mended, or a parcel to be delivered
- Long weekends and holidays in term time (unless very exceptional circumstances are agreed in writing, in advance by the school)
- In the case of term time leave - if a pupil is kept away from school longer than was agreed, the additional absence is unauthorised

Notices to improve

A Notice to Improve is a formal letter that the school may issue to parents when there are serious concerns about a child's attendance.

This will usually happen when a child has had 10 or more unauthorised absences (sessions) within a 10-school week period, and where the school has already worked with the family to try to improve attendance but there has not been sufficient progress. The purpose of a Notice to Improve is to give parents a final opportunity to engage with support and improve their child's attendance, before further action is considered.

We recognise that there are often genuine reasons why a child may find it difficult to attend school. Before issuing a Notice to Improve, the school will always take a support-first approach.

We will work in partnership with you to understand any barriers affecting your child's attendance and provide support that is tailored to your child and family's individual needs, rather than relying only on general school procedures.

Before issuing a Notice to Improve, the school must be able to demonstrate that support has been:

- Individualised, targeted, and responsive, and
- Not limited to universal or whole-school approaches

This means that the school will not rely solely on standard letters, general attendance messages, or routine procedures, but will provide bespoke support based on your child's circumstances. Support will be reviewed regularly and adapted over time, depending on your child's needs and level of absence.

Support will include a balance of both pastoral and academic support:

Pastoral support (removing barriers)

This may include:

- Individual mentoring or regular check-ins
- Support for emotional wellbeing or mental health
- Adjustments to the school day or transition into school
- Working closely with parents to understand family circumstances
- Involvement of Early Help or other external services, where appropriate

Academic support (supporting progress)

This may include:

- Support to help your child catch up on missed learning
- Adjustments to teaching or curriculum where appropriate
- Reassurance for pupils who may feel anxious about returning to learning
- Recognition that pupils may be working below, at, or beyond expected levels, and ensuring support reflects their individual starting point

Before issuing a Notice to Improve, we will ensure that:

- We have communicated clearly with you about attendance concerns
- We have offered appropriate and personalised support
- You understand how absence is affecting your child's progress, wellbeing, and future opportunities
- You have been given opportunities to engage with support and work with the school

If attendance does not improve despite support, the school may issue a Notice to Improve.

The notice will:

- Explain your child's attendance record
- Outline the support already provided
- Set clear expectations for improvement
- Provide a timeframe for improvement (usually between 3 and 6 weeks)
- Explain next steps if attendance does not improve
- During this period, the school will continue to support your child and maintain regular contact with you, while monitoring attendance closely.

If attendance improves, we will continue to support your child to maintain this progress.

If there is not enough improvement, any further unauthorised absence recorded may result in a referral by the school to Medway Local Authority seeking enforcement action, including legal sanctions such as an Education Penalty Notice or prosecution.

A Notice to Improve will not usually be issued unless the school can clearly evidence that:

- Appropriate support has been offered and reviewed
- Support has been individual to your child's needs, not just general school approaches

The school must be able to show that support has been targeted, personalised, and responsive before moving to any formal or legal action.

All support and actions taken will be carefully recorded.

Persistently and Severely Absent pupils (PA and SA)

A pupil is classed a 'persistent absentee' if they miss 10% or more of their schooling across the school year for whatever reason.

A pupil is classed as 'severely absent' if they miss 50% or more of their school across the school year for whatever reason.

We monitor all absence thoroughly. Any pupil that is seen to have reached the PA or SA thresholds or is at risk of moving towards that level, will be prioritised by school. Parents will be informed accordingly.

8. Approved Educational Activity

When pupils are attending educational activities off the school site, that have been approved by the school, the register will be marked to show this is the case.

If a pupil is attending an alternative education provider such as another school, Alternative Provision or Pupil Referral Unit, for part or all of their education, our school will arrange for the pupil to be dual registered at the other setting and mark our registers accordingly.

If a pupil is attending an alternative education provider, which is not a school or Pupil Referral Unit, for part or all of their education, we will mark the sessions which the pupil attends the alternative setting as code B (off-site educational activity). We will liaise regularly with alternative providers to ensure we become aware of any attendance concerns as soon as possible and take follow up action as necessary. Attendance updates will be provided on a daily basis, with the alternative setting.

Attendance data will be reviewed at least weekly by attendance staff and regularly by senior leaders to ensure emerging attendance concerns are identified promptly.

The school retains overall responsibility for the attendance, safeguarding and educational outcomes of pupils attending alternative provision. Attendance, safeguarding, engagement and progress information will be reviewed regularly throughout the placement and recorded as part of the school's quality assurance processes.

Any attendance concerns will be followed up by us, in conjunction with the AP setting.

9. Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances (as set out in DfE attendance guidance)

In accordance with DfE school attendance guidance, our school will record pupils as 'Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances' in the following circumstances (such circumstances are not recorded as absences):

- Our school site, or part of it, is closed due to an unavoidable cause
- The transport provided by our school or the Local Authority is not available and the pupil's home is not within statutory walking distance. (See the DfE's ['Home to school travel and transport'](#) guidance document.
- A local or national emergency has resulted in widespread disruption to travel which has prevented the pupil from attending school.
- The pupil is in custody, but still on the school roll. (If the school has evidence that the pupil is attending educational activities, we can record those sessions as 'present at approved educational activity'.)

10. Support for Poor School Attendance (other than unauthorised term time leave)

Sometimes pupils can be reluctant to attend school. We encourage parents and pupils to be open and honest with us about the reason for the pupil's absence. If a child is reluctant to attend, it is never better to cover up their absence or for a parent to give in to pressure to let the child stay at home. This can give the impression to the child that attendance does not matter and can make things worse. As a school, we need to understand the reasons why a pupil is reluctant to attend in order to be able to support pupils and parents in the best way.

In line with Section 444 of the Education Act 1996, parents/carers have a legal responsibility to ensure their child attends school regularly. This includes contacting the school on each day of their child's absence, providing a clear reason for the absence, and keeping the school updated where absences are ongoing.

When we have concerns about the attendance of a pupil, we will do our best to make the parent/s aware of the concerns about their child's attendance and give them the opportunity to address this. The impact of support strategies will be reviewed regularly and adjusted where necessary to ensure they remain effective and proportionate. However, if parents do not make use of the support offered and improve their child's attendance to an acceptable level, this may result in legal sanctions. Where there are no genuine reasons for the absences, parents may be asked to meet with the [insert role] to discuss the matter. In some cases, this may result in a formal attendance action plan or parenting contract being drawn up.

Where we are unable to establish contact with parents/carers or there are ongoing concerns about a pupil's absence, we will make reasonable enquiries to establish the child's whereabouts and welfare, including undertaking a home visit where contact cannot be made.

If our school is unable to work in partnership with parents to overcome any barriers preventing regular attendance, we may refer a case of poor school attendance to

Medway Local Authority for legal sanctions. We will show all the steps we have taken to support parents and pupils and that we have warned the parent/carers that they are at risk of receiving a Penalty Notice or other legal sanction. This will be evidenced via the sending of warning letters and school records will be shared with Medway Local Authority.

We will not usually request legal sanctions from the Local Authority in cases where poor attendance is symptomatic of complex family circumstances. In such circumstances our school will take a holistic, early help approach to the issue and will involve other agencies if deemed necessary. The exception to this will be where parents fail to accept or engage with support offered by the school and/or other agencies or fail to implement the suggested changes.

Again, when referring for legal sanctions, we will demonstrate that we have taken appropriate steps to warn parents/carers that they are at risk of receiving An Education Penalty Notice or other legal sanction, including by issuing formal letters and a Notice to Improve prior to referral to Medway Local Authority.

If our school has safeguarding concerns about a pupil who is absent, we will share information with other agencies as we deem necessary.

11. Pupils on Reduced (Part-time) Timetables (RTT)

Pupils are entitled to a full-time education, suitable to their age, ability and aptitude, and any special educational needs or disabilities that they may have.

In very exceptional circumstances, where it is in the best interests of the pupil, a temporary reduced timetable may be considered to support the pupil's access to education, reintegration into school, or to meet an identified need. Any reduced timetable must be agreed with parents/carers and, where appropriate, other relevant professionals and agencies.

If, for any reason, our school is unable to provide a pupil with a full-time education due to the pupil's needs, we will work with the pupil, parent and other agencies where appropriate, to come to a mutually convenient arrangement. Any reduced timetables will be for the shortest amount of time possible (max 6 weeks), and subject to regular review, with a clear reintegration plan in place to support the pupil's return to full-time provision as soon as possible.

The school will review the arrangement regularly with the pupil, parent/carers and relevant professionals to ensure it remains appropriate and continues to be in the pupil's best interests and is progressing towards a return to full-time education.

Attendance registers will be completed in accordance with the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024 and DfE guidance. Sessions that form part of an agreed reduced timetable will normally be recorded using Code C2 (Leave of Absence for a compulsory school age pupil subject to a part-time timetable). Where a pupil is receiving education through another approved arrangement, attendance will be recorded using the appropriate statutory attendance code.

Where a pupil has a social worker, the school will ensure they are informed and involved in the reduced timetable process. Where a pupil has an Education, Health and Care

Plan (EHCP), the school will liaise with Medway Local Authority to ensure that the provision and support specified within the plan are reviewed as appropriate.

Our school will submit all signed reduced timetable agreements to Medway Local Authority (LA) reducedtimetables@medway.gov.uk in line with [Medway LA Reduced Timetable Policy](#).

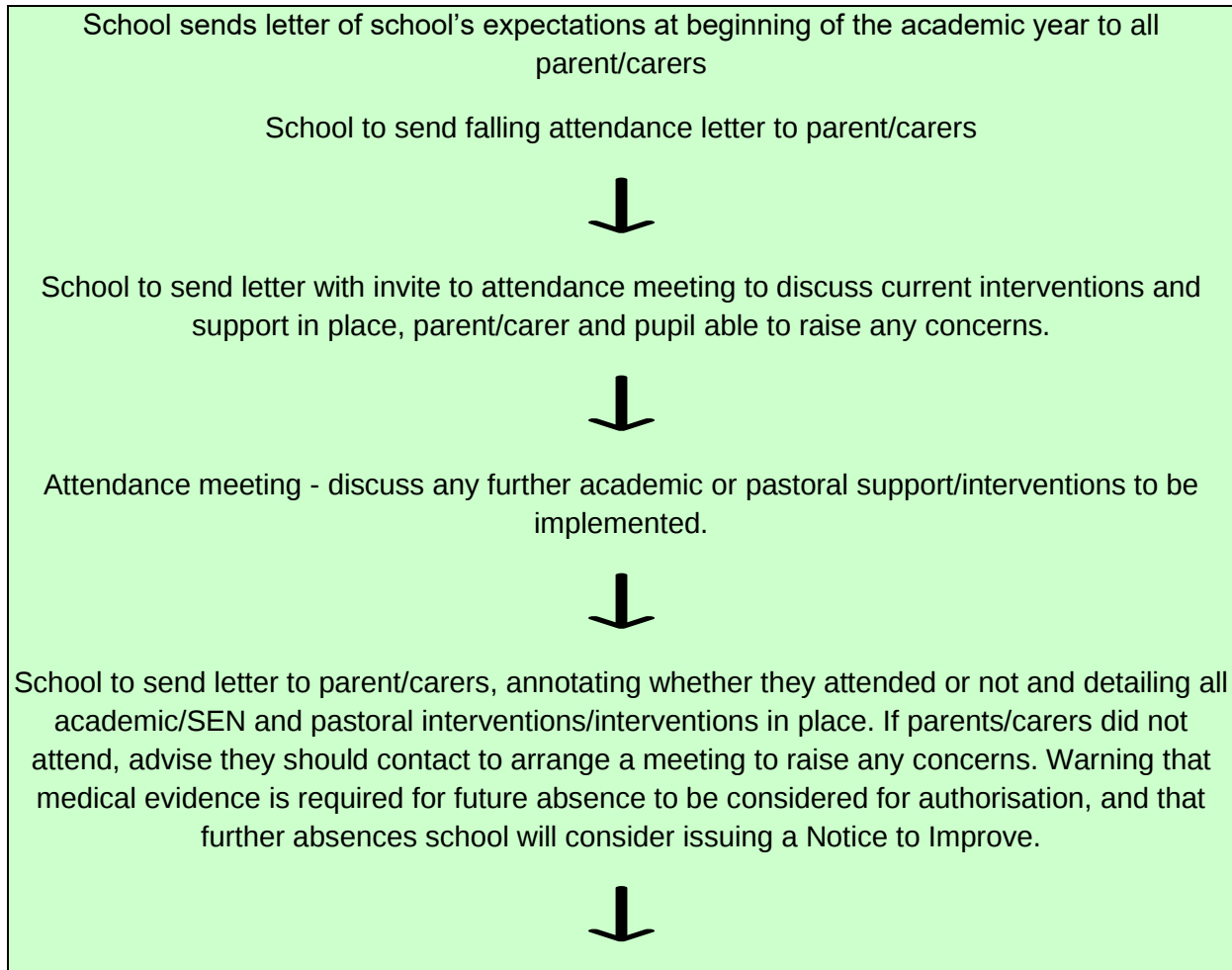
12. Penalty Notices and Prosecutions

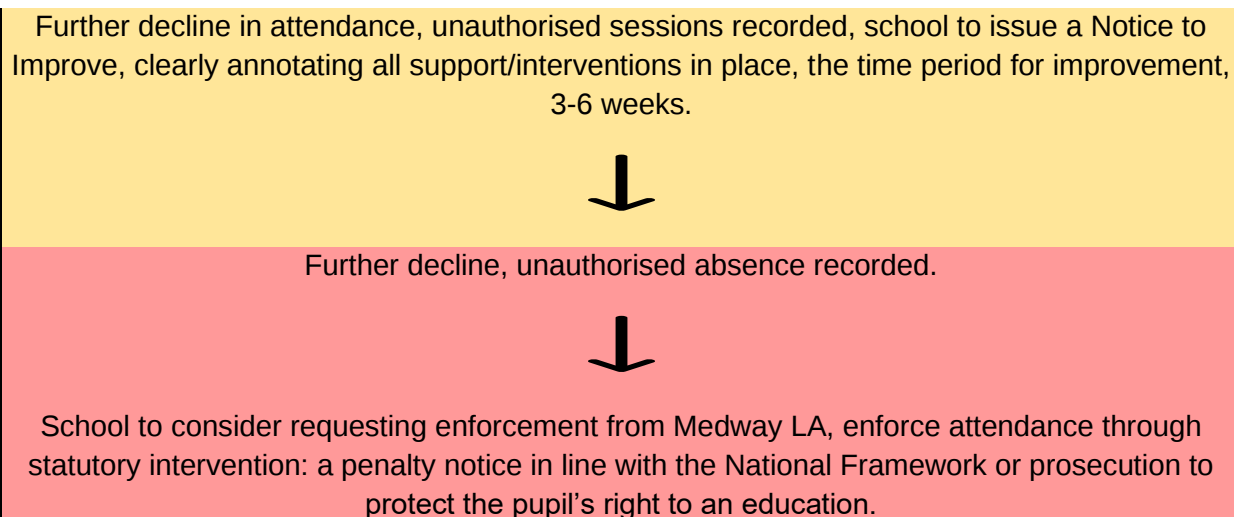
Parents have a legal responsibility to ensure that their child attends school on a regular basis. It is a criminal offence under [Section 444 of the Education Act 1996](#) to fail to secure regular attendance of a registered pupil at the school. This applies to both resident and non-resident parents who may both be subject to legal sanctions if their child fails to attend school regularly. It also applies to others who may not be the parent but may have day to day care of the child.

Unauthorised absence from school can result in a number of different outcomes for parents and children. Each case is considered individually.

Under section 444 of the Education Act 1996, if a child of compulsory school age, who is a registered pupil at a school, fails to attend regularly at the school their parent(s) are guilty of an offence. Parents with more than one school aged child need to be aware that each child's irregular attendance is dealt with as a separate matter.

Escalation Procedures for Poor School Attendance





The school will refer cases of unauthorised absence that meet the threshold for a penalty notice to Medway Local Authority for legal action unless there are reasonable grounds for not doing so. The outcome of a referral to Medway Local Authority may be a penalty notice or prosecution.

Penalty notices are intended as a sanction for low level offences and a tool to support improved school attendance, for example in circumstances associated with an unauthorised holiday taken during term time. They are an alternative to prosecution and may not be issued if prosecution is considered to be a more appropriate response to a pupil's irregular attendance.

Penalty notices must be issued in line with the [Education \(Penalty Notices\) \(England\) Regulations 2024, as amended](#) and can only be issued by a headteacher or someone authorised by them (a deputy or assistant head), a local authority officer or the police. They must also be issued in line with Medway Local Authority Code of Conduct.

See DfE's statutory guidance on [School attendance parental responsibility measures](#) for more information

Please note that Penalty Notices carry fixed amounts and payment deadlines. They cannot be paid in instalments.

The Headteacher has the responsibility for authorising any absence. Parents/carers cannot authorise any absence however, parents/carers can provide reasons for absence for the school to consider.

The local authority or the police can fine parents for the unauthorised absence of their child from school, where the child is of compulsory school age, by issuing a penalty notice.

Before issuing a penalty notice, the school will consider the individual case, including:

- Whether the national threshold for considering a penalty notice has been met (10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a rolling period of 10 school weeks)
- Whether a penalty notice is the best available tool to improve attendance for that pupil

- Whether further support, a notice to improve or another legal intervention would be a more appropriate solution
 - Whether any obligations that the school has under the Equality Act 2010 make issuing a penalty notice inappropriate Each parent who is liable for the pupil's offence(s) can be issued with a penalty notice. The payment must be made directly to the local authority, following receipt of the penalty notice. If the payment has not been made after 28 days, the local authority can decide whether to prosecute or withdraw the notice.
- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28. Any non-payment of the Penalty Notice may be referred to the Magistrates Court.
 - **Second Offence** (within 3 years) - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days. Any non-payment of the Penalty Notice may be referred to the Magistrates Court.
 - **Third Offence** and Any Further Offences (within 3 years) - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

N.B Any holiday-related absence taken that includes 10 sessions in 10 weeks, may result in an Education Penalty Notice. In this instance, a 'Notice to Improve' notification will not be issued beforehand.

A penalty notice may also be issued where parents allow their child to be present in a public place during school hours without reasonable justification, **during the first 5 days of a suspension or exclusion** (where the school has notified the parents that the pupil must not be present in a public place on that day). These penalty notices are not included in the National Framework, not subject to the same considerations about support being provided, and do not count towards the limit as part of the escalation process. In these cases, the parent must pay £60 within 21 days, or £120 within 28 days.

13. Children Missing Education (CME)

Fairview Community Primary School will add and remove pupils from the admissions register in accordance with [Regulation 8 of the School Attendance \(Pupil Registration\) \(England\) Regulations 2024](#). A pupil's name may only be lawfully removed from the register if one of the specific conditions outlined in Regulation 9 applies.

Where the school has concerns that a pupil may be missing education or has potentially moved out of Medway Local Authority, we will consult with our Local Authority Attendance Officer within five school days. In line with safeguarding responsibilities, the school will undertake reasonable enquiries to establish the pupil's whereabouts. These may include:

- Conducting a home visit

- Contacting schools attended by siblings
- Liaising with the allocated social worker/keyworker, where the family is known to Social Care/Family Solutions/Early Help

If the pupil's location remains unknown, or it is confirmed that they have left Medway, the school will complete and submit a Children Missing Education (CME) referral form to the Local Authority Attendance Officer within ten school days.

This process is aligned with statutory safeguarding duties and reflects the expectations set out in Keeping Children Safe in Education and Working Together to Improve School Attendance. It also supports [Medway LA Children Missing Education policy](#), and commitment to identifying, tracking, and supporting children missing education, ensuring that all pupils receive suitable education provision

14. Following up Unexplained Absences

Where no contact has been made with the school the school will contact parent/carers by text, email, telephone or letter to try and establish the reason for a child's absence. When we establish the reason for the absence, we will mark it as authorised or unauthorised depending on the reason for the absence. If we are unable to establish the reason for absence within one school day, we will make the absence as unauthorised, using the **O** code. If we are concerned about a pupil's absence and are unable to contact the parent/carers, we may contact the pupil's emergency contacts and/or other professionals or contacts of the family who we reasonably expect may be able to advise us of the pupil's whereabouts and safety.

15. Direction Off-site (Off-site Direction)

We, as the home school, may use off-site direction as a short-term, time-limited intervention to support a pupil's behaviour. This involves the pupil attending another school, such as alternative provision or another setting, while remaining on our school roll.

During this period, the pupil will usually be **dual registered**. We will notify parents in writing of the placement, including the reason, expected duration and intended outcomes, and will ensure regular review meetings take place.

Attendance will be recorded in line with statutory guidance: typically, **Code D** will be used where the pupil is attending another school under dual registration; **Code B** may be used where the provision is approved educational activity without dual registration; and where a pupil does not attend the agreed provision, this will normally be recorded as **Code O (unauthorised absence)**. **Code E** will only be used where absence is due to a suspension.

16. Managed Moves

A managed move is a voluntary and permanent transfer of a pupil from this (home) school to another mainstream school, used as an early intervention to support improved outcomes and avoid suspension or permanent exclusion. Managed moves will only take place where this is in the pupil's best interests and must be agreed by all parties, including parents, both schools and the admission Local Authority. The home school will ensure parents are fully informed and involved in decision-making and must not place pressure on families to consent.

Where a managed move is agreed, the pupil will be removed from this school's roll and admitted to the new school, meaning the pupil is **single registered**. Managed moves cannot be used on a trial basis; any temporary placement must be arranged through off-site direction.

17. Reporting to Parents

The school will regularly inform parents about their child's attendance and absence levels during parents evening in terms 2 and 4 and on the annual academic end of year report.

Where a child's attendance falls below expected, for whatever reason, our school will contact parents to highlight this, unless there is a good reason not to.

18. Recording Information on Attendance and Reasons for Absence

We will keep an electronic attendance register and place all pupils onto this register.

We will take our attendance register at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark, using the appropriate national attendance and absence codes from the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024, whether every pupil is:

- Present
- Attending an approved off-site educational activity
- Absent
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances
- Any amendment to the attendance register will include:
 - The original entry
 - The amended entry
 - The reason for the amendment
 - The date on which the amendment was made
 - The name and position of the person who made the amendment
- See page 26 for the DfE attendance codes.

We will also record:

- Whether the absence is authorised or not
- The nature of the activity, where a pupil is attending an approved educational activity
- The nature of circumstances, where a pupil is unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances

We will keep every entry on the attendance register for 6 years after the date on which the entry was made.

Attendance concerns/telephone conversations with parents will also be recorded on CPOMs.

School timings can be found in Appendix 1.

19. Roles and Responsibilities

The governing board

The governing board is responsible for:

- Setting high expectations of all school leaders, staff, pupils and parents
- Making sure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties, including:
 - Making sure the school records attendance accurately in the register, and shares the required information with the DfE and local authority
 - Making sure the school works effectively with local partners to help remove barriers to attendance, and keeps them informed regarding specific pupils, where appropriate
- Recognising and promoting the importance of school attendance across the school's policies and ethos
- Making sure the school's attendance management processes are delivered effectively, and that consistent support is provided for pupils who need it most by prioritising staff and resources
- Making sure the school has high aspirations for all pupils, but adapts processes and support to pupils' individual needs
- Regularly reviewing and challenging attendance data and helping school leaders focus improvement efforts on individual pupils or cohorts who need it most
- Working with school leaders to set goals or areas of focus for attendance and providing support and challenge
- Monitoring attendance figures for the whole school and repeatedly evaluating the effectiveness of the school's processes and improvement efforts to make sure they are meeting pupils needs
- Where the school is struggling with attendance, working with school leaders to develop a comprehensive action plan to improve attendance
- Making sure all staff receive adequate training on attendance as part of the regular continued professional development offer, so that staff understand:
 - The importance of good attendance
 - That absence is almost always a symptom of wider issues
 - The school's legal requirements for keeping registers
 - The school's strategies and procedures for tracking, following up on and improving attendance, including working with partners and keeping them informed regarding specific pupils, where appropriate
- Making sure dedicated training is provided to staff with a specific attendance function in their role, including in interpreting and analysing attendance data

The headteacher

The headteacher is responsible for:

- The implementation of this policy at the school
- Monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors
- Supporting staff with monitoring the attendance of individual pupils
- Monitoring the impact of any implemented attendance strategies
- Issuing fixed-penalty notices, where necessary, and/or authorising Liz Hewkins to be able to do so
- Working with the parents of pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) to develop specific support approaches for attendance for pupils with SEND, including where school transport is regularly being missed, and where pupils with SEND face in-school barriers
- Communicating with the local authority when a pupil with an education, health and care (EHC) plan has falling attendance, or where there are barriers to attendance that relate to the pupil's needs
- Communicating the school's high expectations for attendance and punctuality regularly to pupils and parents through all available channels

The designated senior leader responsible for attendance

The designated senior leader is responsible for:

- Leading, championing and improving attendance across the school
- Setting a clear vision for improving and maintaining good attendance
- Evaluating and monitoring expectations and processes
- Having a strong grasp of absence data and oversight of absence data analysis
- Regularly monitoring and evaluating progress in attendance
- Establishing and maintaining effective systems for tackling absence, and making sure they are followed by all staff
- Liaising with pupils, parents/carers and external agencies, where needed
- Building close and productive relationships with parents to discuss and tackle attendance issues
- Creating intervention or reintegration plans in partnership with pupils and their parents/carers
- Delivering targeted intervention and support to pupils and families

The designated senior leader responsible for attendance is Karin Tillet and can be contacted via the school office.

The attendance officer

The school attendance officer is responsible for:

- Monitoring and analysing attendance data (see section 7)
- Benchmarking attendance data to identify areas of focus for improvement
- Providing regular attendance reports to school staff and reporting concerns about attendance to the designated senior leader responsible for attendance, and the headteacher
- Working with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence
- Advising the headteacher when to issue fixed-penalty notices

The attendance officer is Liz Hewkins and can be contacted via the school office.

Class teachers

Class teachers are responsible for recording attendance for both morning and afternoon sessions on a daily basis, using the correct attendance codes, and submitting this information to the school office by 9.15am.

School office staff

School office staff will:

- Take calls from parents/carers about absence on a day-to-day basis and record it on the school system
- Record attendance concerns on CPOMS, for Family Support Manager, to provide them with additional support regarding attendance.

Parents

Where this policy refers to a parent, it refers to the adult the school and/or local authority decides is most appropriate to work with, including:

- All natural parents, whether they are married or not
- All those who have parental responsibility for a child or young person
- Those who have day-to-day responsibility for the child (i.e. lives with and looks after them)

Parents are expected to:

- Make sure their child attends every day on time
- Report the absence on Parentmail, or call the school (01634 338710) to report their child's absence before 9am on the day of the absence and each subsequent day of absence) and advise when they are expected to return
- Provide the school with more than 1 emergency contact number for their child

- Ensure that, where possible, appointments for their child are made outside of the school day
- Keep to any attendance contracts that they make with the school and/or local authority
- Seek support, where necessary, for maintaining good attendance, by contacting Danielle Hind (Family Support Manager) who can be contacted via the school office

Pupils

Pupils are expected to:

- Attend school every day, on time

Fairview's Procedures for Attendance Recording and Absence Management/ Children Missing in Education Guidance

From: DAY 1 of Absence	A child not attending school is considered a safeguarding matter. This is why information about the cause of any absence is always required. If a child is absent and we have not received any notification, we will telephone parents and if no contact is made, we will send a Parent Mail(email) to parents/carers on the first day of absence. If the child is subject to a child protection plan the procedures set out for day two unexplained absence will be implemented immediately.
From: DAY 2	If a child is not seen and contact has not been established with any of the named parents/carers, on the second day of absence, we will make all reasonable enquiries to establish contact with parents/carers and the child, including making enquiries to known friends, wider family and other schools where siblings are known to attend. and undertaking home visits. We also would conduct a home visit, should we be concerned, or if a holiday was suspected. We will keep records of every attempt we have made to confirm the whereabouts and safety of the child. If we are able to confirm that the child is safe we will arrange a home visit. If there is no response to the home visit, a letter will be hand delivered requesting contact and advising that if necessary, liaison with the Police and Children's Services will be initiated. This action will be taken on day one if deemed necessary
From: DAY 3	We will undertake another home visit. If there is no response, we may contact Children's Social Care and following their advice, we may also contact the police to request they undertake a welfare check.
From: DAY 10	We have a legal duty to report the absence of any pupil who is absent without an explanation for 10 consecutive days to the Local Authority Attendance Officer and Child Missing Education Officer. Joint reasonable enquiries will be undertaken to locate the child. The school will write to parents advising of the possible removal from roll of the pupil following the twentieth day of unauthorised absence.
